Hi friends,

During the Tuesday night Cornerstone class I was leading this fall, we were

watching a series of theatrical portrayals of stories from scripture, as written and performed by Ted Swartz and Lee Eisleman (two of my favorite storytellers!). We were watching a scene that the duo created about the prophet Jonah handing in his resignation letter to God after the whole Nineveh... swallowed by a whale... "thing."

In the midst of the scene, God says to Jonah "I've invented this new thing; it's called psychiatry." To which Jonah says, "sounds expensive." As the scene unfolds, God continues, "I want you to pretend you're me... talk to me like God would." Jonah balks at the idea and says he can't do that because "I don't understand you, I don't get what you are doing... sometimes you seem so far away." The scene is heartwarming for me because as it plays out, it becomes hard to know if Jonah is talking as God or as Jonah. In the scene, God listens as Jonah says the line... "sometimes you seem so far away."

Although it is a scene that is based on an Old Testament story, it so subtly gives me a new insight into the reality of Jesus, or at least the notion of the "incarnation," to use a churchy word . . . God becomes human and walks with us to bridge that chasm that has kept us from experiencing God!

During the season of Advent, we as a church celebrate that God is no longer far away. Not because we long for a closeness to God, but because God longs to be close to us as well! That's the miracle of this season . . . a deep, abiding realization that God crossed time, space, and all boundaries to become human, in the frailness of a child, born in a backwater village without fanfare or riches, because sometimes WE seem so far away.

I hope in this season of joy and expectation that we call Advent, we are renewed by the good news that God wants to be close to us! I hope it's a miraculous and wonderful season of Advent, friends!

Peggy was one of several volunteers from local churches to support UMCOR's work in Salt Lake at the distribution center in making kits to support those impacted by disasters in the United States.

For Christmas, we are exploring ways our church might assist the Boys and Girls Club (our new neighbor) in their work with kids and families from the neighborhood.

We are also exploring how our church might be of support in the community in the event of a disaster. How do you see our church's involvement? Share your ideas!

Looking globally, Susan Sandmeier has established connections with Louise Kienzle of Hermiston who leads a mission effort in Kenya. We are exploring ways to refocus our Koins for Kenya revenues from the sale of our free trade coffee, chocolate, and tea. More to come!!


Within 40 minutes, my lawns were beautifully clean! Cookies, cider, and hugs followed, and then they were gone.



Light the Way

Make some Christmas candles to remember Jesus, the Light of the world.



What you need:

- Unlined white notecards
- Hot glue (and adult help)
- Yellow tissue paper
- Mini muffin liners
- Clothespins

What you do:

- 1. Roll a notecard from side to side into a "candle" tube. Secure with glue.
- 2. Insert a piece of tissue paper "flame" in one end.
- 3. Glue the other end to a muffin liner. Then glue the liner to a clothespin.
- 4. Repeat to make many paper candles. Pin them to the branches of a Christmas tree.

Holly

Holly was first used by pagans to decorate for the festival of Saturnalia. When Christians began celebrating Christmas in

honor of Christ, they adapted that decorating practice to reflect Jesus' life and death. Holly's pointed leaves symbolize the crown of thorns and its red berries symbolize Christ's blood shed on the cross. Because holly thrives and its berries retain their brilliance even in harsh winter conditions, non-Christians saw it as a symbol of eternity — which is fitting for Christians as well.
