

Pastor's Hi friends!

Several years ago, I started a tradition of letting

the youth have a night where they could play "stump the Pastor" during youth group. Over the years, it's had a wide variety of responses. Sometimes there has been an awkward silence; the kids haven't had any questions, and we've ended up singing some songs and playing volleyball. Other times it has been a wonderful time during which heartfelt questions about church and God were asked, and on one occasion, as a group, we were able to affirm a young woman's feeling towards a call to ministry herself.

Like most things, there is an obvious moment when discussions and conversations are done . . . with youth, it's usually the time that questions such as "Did Adam have a belly button?" and "If God can do anything, can He make a rock so heavy that he couldn't lift it?" come up. I remember several years ago on "stump the pastor" night, the conversation was coming to an end and more silly questions were being asked. One middle school boy asked, "What's the meaning of life?" Whether it was divine intervention or I just got lucky ( or a little of both), I, without missing a beat, said "That's easy . . . 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your mind, and all your soul. . . and love your neighbor as yourself!"

Believe it or not, the season of Lent is right around the corner. Ash Wednesday is February 26. During the season of Lent, I'll be crafting my sermons from a wonderful book Scot McKnight wrote called THE JESUS CREED. It is about the reply Jesus gives when challenged by the Pharisees, as recorded in Matthew Chapter 22:

Hearing that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, the Pharisees got together. One of them, an expert in the law, tested him with

this question: "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?"
Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments."

# **Better together**

Racial reconciliation is a hot topic among Christians these days. In Sikeston, Missouri,



which has a history of segregation, two church bodies recently decided to live out the gospel's message of unity by merging.

Kenny King, pastor of the mostly black Smith Chapel, and William Marshall, pastor of the mostly white Trinity Baptist, had become friends. They realized both churches, while healthy, were undergoing transitions, so they joined forces. The new congregation's name, Grace Bible Fellowship, represents God's grace and the grace we extend to others — no matter their skin color.

"We want to ... give people the benefit of the doubt instead of letting these issues divide us," King says. "The gospel of Jesus Christ has the power to keep us together and not keep us separated."



Where is your call in the community?

This is a question the Community Ministry team is asking now and throughout the new

year. It is a question only you can answer, but we thought we might highlight some areas of service in the community where some of our members are now following their call.

Grace Clinic is a free clinic that began operating in June 2002, seeing patients for 4 hours each Saturday in the basement of the Methodist church in downtown Pasco. Now

located in the old Benton-Franklin Counties Health Department building on Canal Drive, the clinic is open Tuesday through Saturday and offers primary medical care, life coaching and counseling services, and limited dental services. Since opening, the clinic has served 80,303 patients. In 2019, the clinic was open 252 days serving 8,068 patients who averaged 46 years in age. 80% of the patients at the clinic would be classified as working poor. They make too much to qualify for Medicaid but too little to pay for their own coverage.

The clinic has a budget of about \$600,000 a year and utilizes a limited number of paid staff plus volunteer health care providers (doctors, nurses, nurse practitioners, physician's assistants, dentists, dental hygienists, medical residents, translators, food pantry workers, and receptionists). The clinic helps patients acquire needed prescription drugs at reduced or no cost, particularly those with chronic health issues like diabetes.

So, if you are feeling a call to help heal people, there is a place for you at the clinic. Even if you don't feel the call to serve directly, you may wish to help the clinic financially. Many of the health patients require lab work which costs about \$22/patient – perhaps you are in a position to help with this co-pay by making a donation.

# **Kennewick First UMC Members to Rebuild Homes in Saipan**

Three Kennewick First UMC members will be traveling April 3 through 19 to the North Marianas Island of Saipan to rebuild roofs and enclose homes damaged by Super Typhoon Yutu. Mike Thien, Kathy Bryson, and Dana Bryson are part of an eight-member team that will travel for two days to reach one of the furthest US Commonwealth islands. Only Guam is further, through which the team will travel to reach Saipan.



Super Typhoon Yutu made landfall on Saipan and nearby Tinian on October 25, 2018, with gusts of 190 mph causing catastrophic damage to the small islands. It was the strongest



typhoon to ever hit the North Marianas Islands and the second strongest to hit the US or its territories. The initial response was from nearby military organizations in Guam, Hawaii, and the mainland; these groups tarped roofs and set up cabin tents for temporary shelter. FEMA took on the next phase of bringing in skilled volunteer teams to get people out of the tents and into their homes. Known as United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) teams, skilled volunteers from across the nation have been serving in Saipan since March 2019 in very hot, high-humidity tropical conditions constructing roof joists and attach-

ing metal roofs, along with installing doors and windows. Mike, Kathy, and Dana will be on one of the last teams to serve in Saipan under the FEMA volunteer program.
