Pastor's Soooooo, here we are . . About a month ago I was planning how I was going to be leading worship with this new group of

people in our first Holy Week and Easter together. Now I'm planning Holy Week and Easter in a way I have never done before in 24 years of ordained ministry. All of us are experiencing our daily lives in new ways. I find it so ironic and somewhat holy that many of us made a decision to stay off of the computer during Lent and now email, Facebook, Skype, and Zoom video conferences are our connection to each other while we stay in our homes.

I was on about my 4th Zoom conference of the day, logged in with a group of colleagues just to check in and say "hey!" We lamented over the struggles we were having . . . we confessed to being weary and tired. I know for me, although the work is difficult and there is the added wrinkle of doing it isolated and at home, it's the constant and consistent stress of this "thing" that is looming, that changes plans after they have been made, that threatens us even when we can't see it, and that occupies my thoughts so many hours of the day. It is exhausting! I would rather be at work doing something for 12 hours and be tired at the end of the day, than spend 20 hours laying on the sofa dwelling about all the unknown. ... unknowns looming on the horizon.

During that Zoom call with friends, we began to share the ways each of the congregations we serve was overcoming the obstacles to "being the church" . . . one more creative than the next. For the first time in 3 weeks, I didn't feel the "woe is me . . . how will I make it??" feeling, but genuinely saw this as an opportunity to truly BE THE CHURCH while we and our neighbors are frightened and full of uncertainty. What an opportunity to understand what it means to connect with each other when we are forced to be isolated. What an opportunity to understand what it means to worship together. . . when we can't be together! So many new ways to understand how God's spirit occupies the space between us. So many ways to express our love for God and each other. To be honest, while we have been isolated, I feel as though I have contacted and connected with more of us than I have in the first 6 months I have been your pastor. On the first Sunday that we needed to cancel inperson worship together and we had about 38 hours to figure something out . . . I went on Facebook and shared a brief worship service and a short homily that has been viewed nearly 900 times and has passed through the Facebook feeds of over 1000 people.

I am reminded of the passage in Philippians 4:6-7:

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

It doesn't mean that those of us who love Jesus or are part of a wonderful church like KFUMC won't face hardship or times of trouble, but it does remind me that in those times, a heart and mind that meditates on the love shown to us by the Prince of Peace finds rest and peace that passes understanding.

Be safe my friends! Stay home! Stay safe! and WASH YOUR HANDS!!

Reach Out and Touch Someone by Cynthia Bement

In 1979, the AT&T company created the slogan Reach out and touch someone. The original phrasing was to communicate is the beginning of understanding, so reach out and touch someone. While this ad was written over 40 years ago and aired on television during a time when homes were equipped with a land line phone that the family shared, it is still applicable today!



We are surrounded by many different types of technology that help us to communicate with each other. We can choose to use a computer, tablet, smart TV, smart phone, or telephone, and many households have several different devices to choose from, but even if a person doesn't use technology, the telephone, land line style, is still a great communication tool! The corona virus has us all practicing "social distancing," which is so very important to our health and the health of our community, but can leave us feeling a bit lonely. Though we can't go into the church building at this time, it is important to remember that the church is our community of faith . . . the body, not the building. Pastor Mark is bringing the Word of God through technology with the help of Margo, Amberley and Chuck, and so church is being brought to us in our homes. Rachel and Starlite are ministering to our children and youth using technology, too. The Lay Shepherds, volunteers, and I are making phone calls to many of our church members. Our first choice would be to gather in person for worship, learning, and fellowship, but challenging times call us to use all our best resources and so we are. One of my favorite scriptures is Galatians 6:10: When we have the opportunity to do good to anyone, we should do it. But we should give special attention to those who are in the family of believers. This scripture goes hand-in-hand with a quote from one of John Wesley's sermons: doing good, all possible good, in every possible kind and degree, to the household of faith, to all men.

As part of the Kennewick First community, I encourage you to reach out and touch someone . . . do not wait for the phone to ring, be the instigator of communication and love to your neighbor through Jesus Christ. If the Holy Spirit puts someone on your heart or mind . . . call them. The Lay Shepherds are hoping to communicate with over 100 people a week, and we know there are many more who might like a call. My prayer is that this time of "social distancing" from what have been our normal gatherings in the church building will empower and enlighten us to some new ways to reach out and touch each other in safe, loving, kind ways.

I find that I am less lonely when I am communicating . . . so I will choose to reach out and do some good for me too by spending time with the Lord through prayer, quiet meditation, scripture, devotions, worship by way of technology, listening to my favorite Christian music, and by making phone calls to my friends and church family!
