


Lenten read – try it, you might like it!



Copies of the book can be purchased for about \$10 from Amazon, both Kindle and paperback, or from a vendor of your choice.

This Wednesday morning class, led by Rick and Mikki McKinnon, will begin on March 12 at 10 a.m. in the library.

The author of the book is also the presenter in the study video. She delves into the history and literature surrounding the last days of Jesus' life. She sets the narrative in historical context and analyzes the risks and motives of the story's characters. She shows how the text raises ethical and spiritual questions for the reader and how we all face risk in our Christian experience.

Levine is Distinguished Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies at Hartford International University for Religion and Peace and previously professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies at Vanderbilt Divinity School and College of Arts and Science.

# Entering the Passion of Jesus: Our Worship Series for Lent

# Come, Enter the Story

This Lent we are invited to enter the Passion of Jesus, to picture ourselves in the story — as if we were there when it happened!

What is the Passion of Jesus? It is the story of the last week of his life, of his suffering, arrest, trial, and execution. Jesus will take many risks that week, and there will be consequences.

What about us? Are we willing to put ourselves in the story? Are we willing to see, hear, and feel what Jesus may be experiencing? Are we willing to take those risks with him? Or are we content be merely distant observers?

The Parade: Risking Reputation
The Temple: Risking Righteous Anger
The Teaching: Risking Challenge
The First Dinner: Risking Rejection
The Last Supper: Risking Loss of Friends
The Garden: Risking Temptation

Each Sunday during Lent we will look closely at one of the events of Jesus' last week, a week we call Holy Week. We will participate in a parade that is both celebration and political statement. We will witness Jesus turn the tables and call out the greedy and unscrupulous. We will overhear him teaching. We will question his frugality. We will be shocked by his servant-like actions. And we will fail him. Each Sunday we will freeze-frame a moment so we can look closely at what is happening, at the risks Jesus is taking. And we will wonder—are we considering our own role in this ongoing story.

Each Sunday, we will enjoy a fine art painting, resourced through the Vanderbilt Divinity Library, that will allow us to visualize a scene from Jesus' story. Each Sunday, we will hear from one of the characters in the painting as they react to what is happening with Jesus. And each Sunday, we will see frames for art that invite us to step into the story.

Try not to be confused. On March 9, the first Sunday of Lent, we will talk about Palm Sunday, because that is the first day of Holy Week, but we will not celebrate Palm Sunday until our calendars say it is Palm Sunday on April 13. Similarly, we will talk about the Last Supper on April 6, and we will talk about the Garden of Gethsemane on April 13, even though both those events do not happen on our calendar until April 17 when we will celebrate Maundy Thursday. These are powerful stories that will bless our understandings as we allow ourselves to spend time with them, and in them.

# Lent means what?

The word Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon word lencten, which means "spring." The root words mean "long days," and this combination probably refers to the increasing daylight at this time of year.

Lent lasts for a long time: 40 days. In scriptural references 40 means a long time, whether counted in days on the ark with Noah, years in the wilderness as slaves freed from Egypt, or the days of temptation Jesus faced in the wilderness at the beginning of his ministry.

Christians use the 40 days of Lent for reflection and preparation. We reflect on our own lives and on Jesus' life; we prepare for Jesus' passion during Holy Week and his resurrection on Easter.

Anyone with a calendar will tell you there are more than 40 days from the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday to the end of Lent on Holy Saturday. Those extra 6 days are Sundays, which means they are considered little Easters in church tradition. They do not count as part of Lent.

In 2024, he received the Stewardship Award from the Mid-Columbia Agriculture Hall of Fame.

Our UWF President, Kathy Wertman, will lead members through a short review of upcoming missions and events. Her board will bring treats for all, and sharing gifts members bring will be for the Legacy Fund.

# "Pave the Way"

Beginning on Sunday, March 30, you will be

able to purchase an engraved paver (brick) to be permanently installed in the courtyard of the Kennewick First United Methodist Church. This "buy a brick" campaign will help offset the cost of the church beautification project.

This fundraising campaign allows people to purchase a paver to commemorate someone. The buyer can choose to honor themselves, a living family member or friend, or someone who has passed. Each brick will be the same size with the same font (lettering). There will, however, be a few assorted icons that can be added to mark an event such as baptism, membership date, or wedding, etc., for an extra fee. The cost of each 6 by 12 inch paver will be \$200 with an additional fee of \$25 for an icon.

The order forms will be available for the first time at church on March 30 following worship (in the narthex). Beginning the next day, on March 31, forms will be available in the church office, OR on the church website (print them off), OR at the information desk where they can be picked up on Sunday. Completed forms can be dropped off at the church office or mailed in. You may pay by cash, check, credit card, or through Pushpay. This campaign is beginning now to help raise the funds needed to start the front courtyard project. The pavers will be laid in 2026. Please help us get the word out so we can pave the way!

Funds raised will be used for both the church beautification project and future facilities projects. This project will add to the beauty of our neighborhood and will help those who see our building feel the holy presence of God.

# Intercessory Prayer

This prayer practice is ancient, with examples found in the Old Testament, and the book of Psalms is filled with verses about prayer and intercession. Jesus prayed for others, and the Apostle Paul urged believers to pray for each other, too. Intercessory prayer has the power to change lives and build faith. When we pray for others, we are in connection with God on a deeper level, seeking God's guidance and wisdom.

Our church has a list of prayers that are typically emailed weekly to those who wish to lift others in prayer. I am inviting those who would like to serve the Lord in this way to let me know, so that you, too, can join others in lifting up the needs of others, helping to bear their burdens and offer support in times of need.
